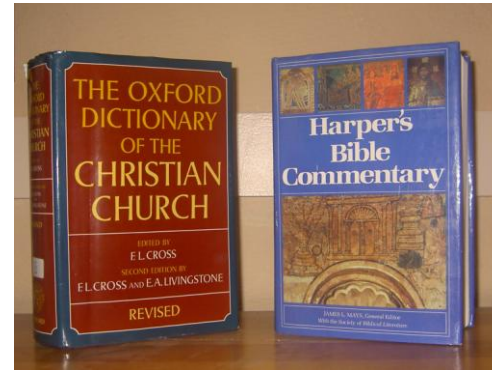


**A good book is a blessing –

The books, more than 600 in number, are housed on the lower floor of the church hall, in the comfortably-appointed King Room named for Canon King, Rector of St Paul's from 1914 to 1944. It is open during coffee hour following services and when meetings are held in the King Room.

The Library was founded during the incumbency of the then Reverend (now Most Reverend) David Crawley as Rector of St Paul's. Initial funding was provided in 1986 in memory of Margaret Avery, a parishioner who was tragically killed in a traffic accident.
